Course Description:

Sociological exploration of American racial and ethnic diversity. Emphasis given to the social construction of race and ethnicity, patterns of intergroup contact and global migration. Historical comparative analysis of selected groups with emphasis given to economic, political and structural inequalities.

Social Construction of Inequality

Analyze the social construction of inequality by race and ethnicity taking into consideration the intersections of gender, class, age and ability.

Assessment Method: Locally developed exams

Compare and contrast socio-demographic and socioeconomic experiences of select ethnic and racial groups in the United States.

Examine stereotypes, prejudice and behaviors regarding select racial and ethnic groups. Identify important differences within and among groups.

Analyze the social, economic, and political implications of changing national and global demographics.
